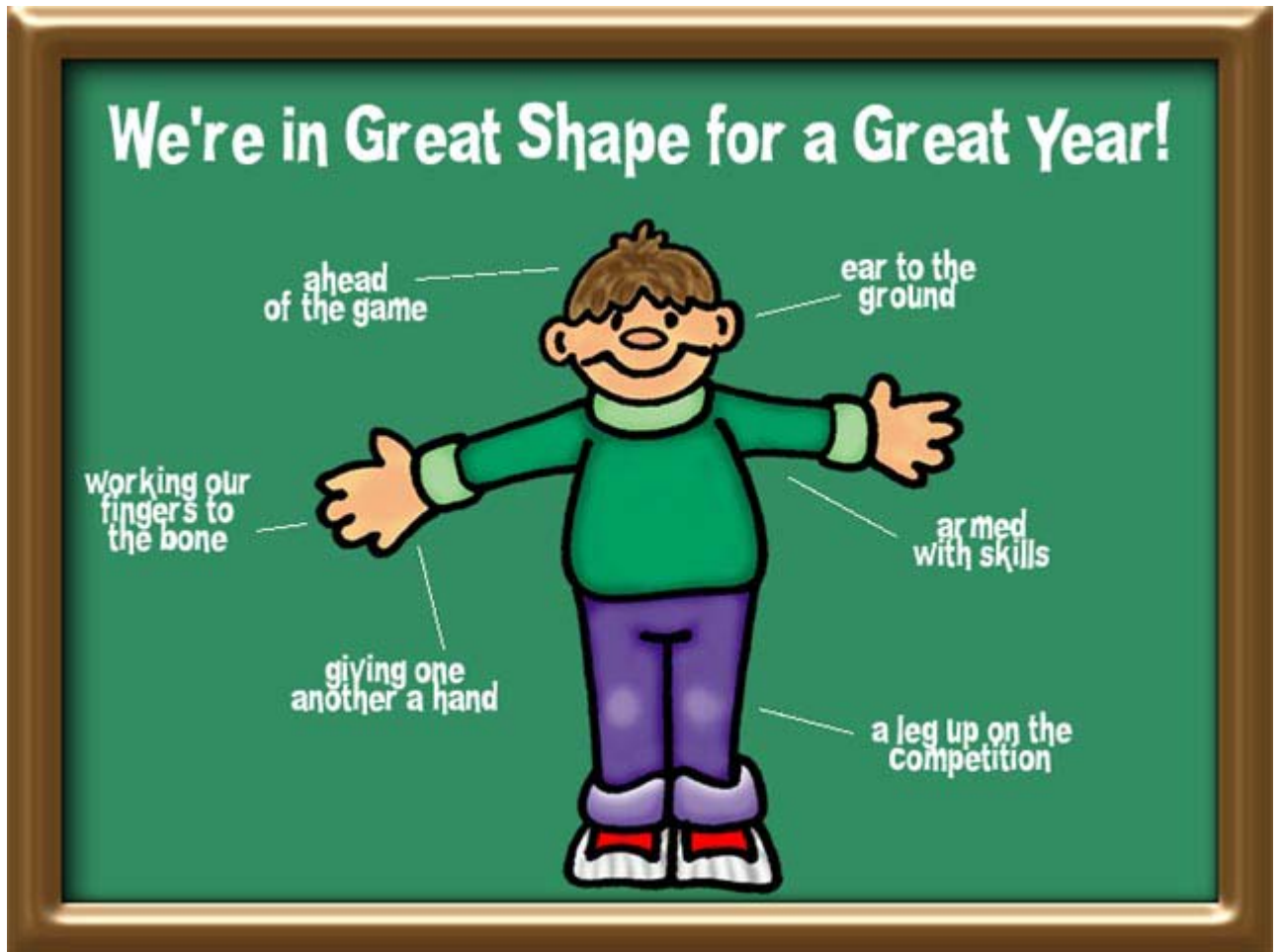




B. 2.- Bulletin Boards

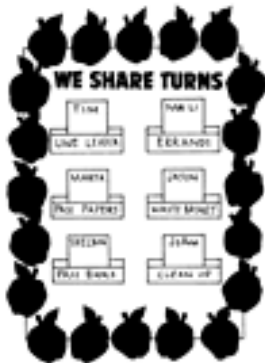
2.-

This bulletin board and is just adorable! Prior to the beginning of school, ask your parents to send you a snapshot of their child. The bulletin board itself is a giant school bus on the road to school. In each window, have a child's picture. In the driver's seat, include your own picture. A cute way to start the year!

3.- Apple Bulletin Board

Create a changeable bulletin board that helps teach responsibility by assigning classroom duties to students.



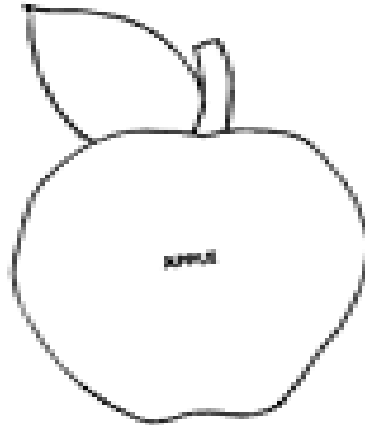
Materials and Supplies

- Black cloth background
- Red apple border
- Red letters
- Red and green paper (optional)
- White computer paper (amount optional)
- Any white paper that crayons can write on (Used computer paper, clean on one side, is good.)
- Transparent tape
- Crayons
- Scissors
- Glue

Instructions

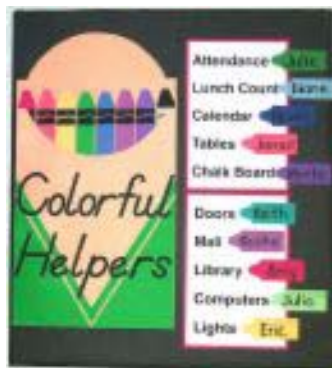
1. Talk with children about special class duties: erasing chalkboard, passing papers, leading lines, cleaning up, passing the wastebasket, handing out books, and so on.

Use the apple pattern to cut enough red apples with green leaves and stems to go around your bulletin board, or use white paper and colour apples heavily. Tape apples in place.

4.- As another alternative, trace around your hand and use various colours of hands for a border.

* Fold computer paper nearly in half, lengthwise, and glue the ends together. (These make pockets for children's duties.)

* Cut enough white paper slips, 18 by 14, for each child's name so that when it's his or her turn for a class duty you can put a slip with the child's name on it in the pocket for that duty.

* Change names each week.

5.- Career Bulletin Board



Objectives

- Students will learn about different careers.
- Students will create a "Career Collage" bulletin board.

Materials

- 4x6 index cards or construction paper
- Magazines and newspapers

Procedures

1. A few days before the lesson, invite students to bring in pictures from magazines, newspapers, and other sources that show people at work. Encourage students to check sports pages, movie ads, and kids' sections for some creative examples.
2. Lead students in brainstorming a list of careers.
3. Write the students' ideas on the board.
4. Ask each student to select one of the careers on the board.
5. Have each student write the name of a career in large print in the middle of a 4x6 note card.
6. Direct students to find pictures of the career they picked in the magazines and newspapers.
7. Ask students to neatly cut out at least three pictures of their career.
8. Create a "Career Collage" by displaying the names of the careers and the cut-out pictures on a bulletin board.

6.- **First Day of Preschool Kite Bulletin Board**

We are here to hold you tight...until you learn to fly your own kite!

First you cut out poster board in the shape of a school house and put that in the centre of your bulletin board.

Then cut out figures to represent the teachers in that classroom. Be sure to take a picture of each teacher and place their photo on the head of each figure. Place these teachers on the board next to the door of the school house.

Then cut out large kites and write each child's name on a kite. Attach all of the kites in the sky area on the board.

Then attach yarn or string to the ends of each kite.

Make sure you measure out enough string so that each kite's string can also be attached to one of the teacher/figures' hands on the board.

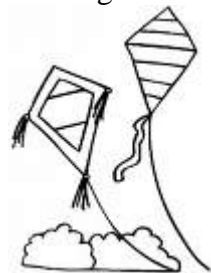


On the first day of school, give each child a smaller figure to water-colour. On that same day, take each child's picture and get it developed.

Later that week add the child sized figures to the bulletin board. Just before back to school night, you can transfer the yarn/string still attached to the teachers, to each child's figures' hand.

Make sure that the name on the kite matches the child that the kite's string is now attached to.

The bulletin board represents how when they first arrived at school they needed the teachers to show them what and how to do everything at school. Now that it has been a couple days/weeks each child has become more independent and self sufficient and is able to do things on their own at times.



7.- Who's That? Bulletin Board

Children in Pre school will create a classroom mural to help learn one another's names.



Kids add photos to the drawings!!

What You Need

- camera
- butcher paper
- pushpins or stapler
- glue or tape
- crayons, coloured pencils, or markers

What to Do

1. Take an individual headshot of each child in the class.
2. Cut butcher paper to fit the bulletin board. Add the word **WELCOME!**
3. Paste pictures of the children on the butcher paper, leaving enough room for the children to draw their bodies below their headshots.
4. Have the children draw their bodies underneath their pictures.
5. Invite the children to write their names or some comment below their portraits. Help if necessary.
6. As part of the daily routine, have the children chant “**Look at**” and then the name of each child, as you all point to his or her picture. End the chant by having everyone say, “Look at us!” as they stretch their arms open wide.
